Open Class Flower Show Guidelines 2017

Enter Time: Friday, July 28th, 9:00-11:00 am

Judging Time: Friday, July 28th, 12:00 pm

Release Time: Sunday, July 30th, 4:30 pm

Rules:

- Entries shall be accepted at 9:00 a.m. -11:00 a.m. and must be in place by 11:30 a.m. and may not be removed until 4:30 p.m. on Sunday.
- Only amateurs may enter. Men or women. All ages allowed. Exhibits not limited to Hancock County.
- Exhibitors may make more than one entry per class or subclass if each entry is a different species, variety, cultivar type, or color.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own containers, clear glass preferred; wedging is allowed), tag his or her exhibit, No Entry Fee. Ribbons awarded with prizes for top winners.
- Hancock County Fair Board will not be responsible for damages or loss of entries including containers.
- First, Second and Third place ribbons will be awarded for each class and/or sub class. One "Best of Show: will be awarded in each section.
- All plant material in horticulture must have been grown by the exhibitor.
 Plant material in Artistic Division and Creative Design Division need not have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 8. Once an entry is made in place, it cannot be removed.
- All entries should be named in each class IF POSSIBLE for flowers and vegetables Plant Name & Cultivar: example (Zinnia, "Crystal White"), for plants Common & Scientific Name: example (heartleaf philodendron, "philodendron condatum".

- 13. Some General Definitions to classify flowers:

Spike – A lengthened flower cluster in which the florets are stem-less.

Spray – A main stem with side branches and blooms on all sides.

Stem – A category that evaluates the non-flower part of the specimen, including leaves. The stem supporting the bloom should be strong and in proportion to the flower.

Bloom – the flower, no leaves.

Class G: Potted Plant – grown for foliage only

Class H: Potted Plant - flowering

Class I: Potted Plant - vining

- a. Ivy
- b. Pothos or Philodendron
- c. Any other vining plant

Class J: Outdoor Planter – Mixture of at least 2 plant varieties in container, created for outdoor use only

- a. Small (15" and under container)
- b. Large (over 15" container)

Class K: Hanging Basket – any variety (for indoor or outdoor use)

Class L: Succulents

- a. 1 plant, any type
- b. 2 or more plants, any type

Class M: Terrariums - any

Class N: Fairy Garden – any

Class O: Any other container grown plant

Section F: Artistic Design (fresh flowers only) – need not be grown by exhibitor

Class A: "Birds and Butterflies" – any arrangement using theme

Class B: "Bicycles Abound" - any arrangement using "biking" theme

Class C: "Down on the Farm" - any arrangement using a farm theme

Class D: "County Fair" – arrangement created for any fair event

Class E: - "Summer Fun" - created by the youth 18 years or younger

Section G: Creative Design (some natural materials must be used – need not be grown by exhibitor)

Class A: Collage

Class B: Wreath

Class C: Wall Hanging

Class E: Table Scape (create a dinner setting for ONE, using your own dinnerware with a floral centerpiece, not necessary to bring silverware, must bring own card table)

- Any variety, 2 ears in plastic wrapper without shucks

Class T: Summer Squash – 2 specimens

- Standard 3 specimens of 1 variety (no green)

Class V: Zucchini – 2 specimens

Class W: Any other Vegetable – 1-3 specimens
